MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING  
MAY 6, 2021

The City Council of Plain City convened in a regular meeting on Thursday, May 6, 2021, accessible via ZOOM beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Approval of Minutes from April 15, 2021

Councilmember Beal asked when the Connex work meeting will be scheduled. The Mayor said he postponed it to the next meeting. **Councilmember Beal moved to approve the minutes from the regular meeting on April 15, 2021 as presented. Councilmember Sadler seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Comments: Public  
None.

Report from Planning Commission

Planning Commissioner, Jarod Maw reported that grandfathered zoning provisions related to a piece of property owned by the Orton family were evaluated and the lot was determined to be buildable without amendment. He indicated that preliminary approval was given to the Robson Farms development and specifically for Phase 1 of proposed subdivision. He reported that the Commission recommended denial of zoning amendments requested by Tom Favero (RE-30 to RE-18.5 and A-2 to RE-15). He noted that disapproval of the rezone petitions was based on noncompliance with the General Plan/Future Land Use Map. He told of a drawn-out discussion on a proposed ordinance amendment to extend the Cul-De-Sac maximum length restriction. He explained that consensus could not be reached on practical reasons for an adjustment, going forward.

Public Hearing: Amendment of Zoning Ordinance Concerning the Residential Overlay Zone

**Councilmember Sadler moved to open the public hearing for the amendment of the Zoning Ordinance Concerning the Residential Overlay Zone. Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.** There were no public comments. **Councilmember Allen moved to close the public hearing. Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye.**

Discussion/Motion: Ordinance – Amendment of Zoning Ordinance Concerning the Residential Overlay Zone

Mayor Beesley indicated that the *Purpose and Intent* content in the revised draft is accurate, in his view. He proposed that site development standards for duplex dwellings in the *Use Regulations* section, be amended to allow reduced frontage. He expressed approval of an eight-foot minimum side setback. He spoke of density limitations and outlined the Technical Review Committee's role in the application process. Commissioner Maw displayed a diagram of the mentioned site development standards. He illustrated changes in real-time as instructed by councilmembers. Mayor Beesley advised that the percentage of a dwelling's façade taken up by a garage entry should be regulated under this overlay. Councilmember Sadler requested that the *City Council Action* section (10-2-8) be revised to state: A. The City Council **MAY** hold a public hearing on the proposed Residential Overlay Zone. He commented on State mandated basins for stormwater detention or retention that occupy more than five acres and questioned the merit in figuring the entire area into open space calculations. Commissioner Maw affirmed that a revised diagram of site development standards will be forwarded to all members of the Planning Commission. **Councilmember Sadler moved to return the draft ordinance to Planning Commission for revising as discussed. Councilmember Beal seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Zoning Amendment – Favero Property – 1295 N 4700 W – RE-30 to RE-18.5 and A-2 to RE-15

Mayor Beesley informed the Council that the Zoning Amendment application has been submitted to them with a recommendation for denial from the Planning Commission. Councilmember Sadler invited Tom Favero to convey his intent for future development of the land cited for rezoning. Land owner, Tom Favero reasoned that RE-15 zoning is appropriate along 4700 West Street. He remarked on a suggestion by the Planning Commission, that transitional RE-18.5 zoning would be suitable between Medium Density Residential 2 (MDR2) segments and lower-density plots to the west. Councilmember Sadler urged that the matter be tabled pending further study of Mr. Favero's plan and research of the lay of the land. He contemplated visiting the site to better appraise potentials. He asked for a personal meeting with Mr. Favero to discuss this proposal. Councilmember Weston asked to be at the meeting/site inspection. Councilmember Beal indicated that she would like to be included in the consultation. Councilmember Sadler considered a on-location City Council work session. Mayor Beesley suggested that those councilmembers who wish to visit with Mr. Favero on-site, should do so in an unofficial capacity. He requested that the application(s) be brought back to the City Council for review after the anticipated

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research is completed. Tom Favero agreed to meet with councilmembers on-site. He commented on trails and open space that his land will accommodate with proper zoning. Mayor Beesley asserted that the area is ideal for public parks and trailways.

Councilmember Sadler added; it's some of the most picturesque land in Plain City. **Councilmember Sadler moved to table Discussion/Motion: Zoning Amendment – Favero Property – 1295 N 4700 W – RE-30 to RE-18.5 and A-2 to RE-15. Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Approval of Tentative 2021-22 City Budget

City Treasurer, Ryan Child referred to a budget spreadsheet that was distributed to councilmembers in advance of the meeting, assuring that the information has been verified and is correct. He displayed the proposed budget and compared the Prior Year Actual figures to 2021 Projected amounts. He gave explanation of the 2022 Budget Proposal. He briefly touched on the impact the COVID-19 pandemic had on budget forecasts. He informed that there are COVID-19 relief funds available through the American Rescue Plan Act. Mayor Beesley stated that Administration will soon deliberate how best to use allocated funds from the program. Councilmember Sadler sought details on cell tower revenues. He spoke of historical designation of cell tower resources to a specific division in the budget. He considered the process through which an earmark set by a past Council can be changed. Ryan Child explained that proceeds from cell tower excises now go into the General Fund. He reviewed expenditure data, highlighting differences between 2021 Projected, 2021 Original and 2022 Proposed figures. Councilmember queried about the addition of a full-time Administrative Assistant position in the proposed Salaries and Wages for 2020. He indicated that he's not been notified that this job is to be created. Mayor Beesley reported asking for the line item to be included with the intent to hire a part-time Mayor's Assistant. He stated that a job description has not been formalized and could not produce requested details. He explained that, as a part-time mayor, he does not have enough time to complete tasks that will benefit the City, such as grant applications, etc. He remarked on the current staff's scope of work. Councilmember Beal asked if it's appropriate to budget for a position that does not exist. She pointed out that the ledger shows a deficit in the Tentative 2021-22 City Budget. Mayor Beesley indicated that salary money must be available in order to move forward with the proposed hiring. He spoke of efforts by staff to optimize budget allotments. He made mention of predictable General Fund surpluses. Councilmember Weston stated that figures listed under position benefits are not applicable for a part-time employee. Ryan Child noted that the City Treasurer payee classification has been changed to contractor from staff employee. City Recorder, Diane Hirschi commented on budget considerations related to the municipal election that will occur this year. Ryan Child called attention to a substantial increase in projected expenditures for Police Service through the Weber County Sheriff's Office. Mayor Beesley re-counted points discussed at a meeting with mayors of cities and towns that also contract with the Weber County Sheriff's Office, concerning adjustments to the service agreement. Councilmember Allen asserted that he does not receive minutes from the Sheriff's quarterly meeting. He referred to a rebate that contract cities should receive due to reduced staffing. Mayor Beesley stated that he will take steps to ensure that minutes from the Sheriff's quarterly meeting are imparted to Plain City Councilmembers. He announced that a follow-up meeting about Sheriff's Office staffing will be held. Ryan Child displayed and reviewed a table depicting Plain City's payment quotient relative to other contracting municipalities. Mayor Beesley outlined the Weber County Sheriff's Office budget structure. He notified; the cost for police service to each contracting city is parleyed among city officials – not set by the Sheriff's Office. Ryan Child added \$2000 to the Maintenance and Operations compartment of the Landfill Budget during the course of discussion. Mayor Beesley described how wages for the Landfill Director and operators have been calculated in the Tentative 2021-22 City Budget. Councilmember Weston pointed out that additional man-hours will be registered in 2021-2022 because of Green Waste Program undertakings. He stated that the landfill saves the City more money than it costs to run. Ryan Child indicated that projected Park Impact Fee Expenditures include the purchase of a new Kubota side-by-side. Mayor Beesley spoke to the usefulness and versatility of these vehicles. Councilmember Sadler commented on acquiring easements for trails. He asked why wages and benefits for the Recreation Department increased substantially from 2019. Ryan Child answered that the Recreation Director's payable hours were increased. Councilmember Sadler maintained that Plain City does not have a Recreation Department Director. He voiced disapproval of paying the Assistant Director of the Recreation Department wages and benefits equal to those of a Director. Mayor Beesley noted that Colette Doxey has been hired to a full-time position. He informed that participation in Plain City recreational sports has expanded, along with venue scheduling and the need for officials. Ryan Child made known the total amount of money currently held in the Capital Projects Fund. In answer to a question by Mayor Beesley, he affirmed that resources in the Capital Projects Fund can be transferred into the General Fund, if necessary. Councilmember Sadler requested a status update on sewer headworks engineering. He remarked on an observed delay in the turnaround time for the professional service. He asked if provisions have been made for a land application treatment system. Mayor Beesley answered in the negative. Public Works Director, Dan Schuler indicated that the City Engineer is currently working on plans for the mentioned land application system. **Councilmember Sadler moved to table Discussion/Motion: Approval of Tentative 2021-22 City Budget, pending a work meeting. Councilmember Skeen seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Set Public Hearing for Final Approval of 2021-22 City Budget – June 3 or June 17

**Councilmember Sadler moved to set a Public Hearing for Final Approval of 2021-22 City Budget – June 17. Councilmember Beal seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Set Public Hearing for Final Adjustments of 2020-21 City Budget – June 17

**Councilmember Sadler moved to set a Public Hearing for Final Adjustments of 2020-21 City Budget – June 17. Councilmember Beal seconded the motion. Councilmembers Allen, Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

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Presentation: UTA – 5-year Plan – Beth Holbrook

Beth Holbrook from UTA introduced her colleagues, Shule Bishop, Director of Governmental Affairs and Andres Colman, Regional General Manager (in attendance) and presented on *Providing the Right Service for Your Community* with the help of a visual exposition. She thanked the Council for the opportunity to do her presentation. She indicated; UTA is working to strengthen coordination with local governments as they plan for the future of transit. She informed that elected officials can call UTA when updating the City's general plan, reconstructing streets and considering approval of new developments. She advised that a UTA representative can propose service changes, initiate a new study, consider placement of bus stop locations or amenities and continue ongoing check-ins. She reviewed UTA's planning process including a five-year service plan. She reported established route numbers and current ridership numbers. She explained that UTA wants to give service to the community and get citizens where they needed to go. She added that some of the Prop 1 funding is being used to improve bus stops in the County as some need upgrading. She informed that new bus stops will be completed in 2021. She explained that a Master Plan has been instituted and mentioned she would be happy to answer any question and outlined points in the development model, called the Transit Oriented Development Model. She spoke of plans for public transportation access without excess cost. She mentioned the example of households needing only one vehicle as a result of nearby public transportation. Addressing the present and future needs of residents, she continued, would require maximizing land use and zoning associated with the transit stops. For Plain City, she added, this would mean looking at density in housing. She explained new housing was critical for people to have access to affordable housing. She continued that millennials had a different perspective on housing; they tend to avoid maintenance issues. She mentioned the growth that has occurred in the northern area of the Wasatch Front pointing that growth means that ridership is important. She added that public transportation would help with air quality concerns. She stated; much data shows that air quality will deteriorate in the coming years and vehicle traffic will become increasingly difficult. She explained that the Wasatch Front Regional Council has established the Wasatch Choice 2050, which addressed many of the present issues around transportation and land use. She suggested that cities are responsible for these, and UTA wants to get feedback from cities to better understand their needs. Councilmember Sadler noted that the northwest side of Weber County does not have access to public transportation through UTA. He related personal experience with bleakly limited scheduling of bus and train routes between Ogden and Salt Lake City. Beth Holbrook acknowledged that UTA service in Weber County will inevitably be expanded in the future. Councilmember Weston asked about plans for the Box Elder County UTA train station. Beth Holbrook explained that Box Elder County is presently on the long-term expansion list. She indicated that land has been purchased for the project. She spoke of corridor preservation efforts. Mayor Beesley commented on light rail routing and operation costs. Councilmember Beal reported grievances by Plain City citizens related to the closure of the Pleasant View FrontRunner station. She contemplated ways UTA might reopen the local line. Beth Holbrook informed that UTA owns the Pleasant View station but does not own the track. She talked about potential bus service from western areas of Weber County into a future FrontRunner station near Business Depot Ogden (BDO), in northern Ogden.

Discussion: 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment City

Mayor Beesley indicated that some residents have approached him about adopting a 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment City resolution. He described the purpose and intent of a 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment City resolution. Councilmember Beal expressed full concurrence with taking such an action. Councilmember Sadler supported the proposal. Councilmember Weston agreed that a 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment City resolution is timely. Councilmember Skeen confirmed his approval of the suggestion.

Motion: Approval of Business Licenses

There were none.

Motion: Approval of Warrant Register

See warrant register dated 04/15/2021 to 04/30/2021. B&C Property Management was reimbursing Brad Orton for the rezone application that was withdrawn. Connection Publishing to for a full-page advertisement in a new magazine (Weber Connection) that will come out to every resident. Diamond Rental is for the canopies, tables and chairs for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration.

**Councilmember Sadler moved to approve and pay the bills as presented. Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. Councilmembers Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Report from City Council

Councilmember Beal commented on the Council's plans for participating in the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade.

Councilmember Weston indicated that the landfill is still experiencing problems with household waste being mixed in green waste loads. He told of efforts to mitigate the problem. He reported difficulties in EMT recertification that will need to be addressed. Councilmember Skeen had no further comment.

Councilmember Sadler mentioned State allocated COVID-19 relief funds that the Utah League of Cities and Towns accounts for at their meetings. He recognized resulting taxes that will impact future generations whether the City uses the grants or not.

Mayor Beesley invited every councilmember to participate in the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade. He accepted Councilmember Beal's offer to organize the Council's involvement.

**At 9:25 p.m. Councilmember Skeen moved to adjourn and was seconded by Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous.**

Approval of Minutes from May 6, 2021

**Councilmember Sadler moved to approve the minutes from the regular meeting on May 6, 2021 as presented. Councilmember Skeen seconded the motion. Councilmembers Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Comments: Public  
None.

Report from Planning Commission

Planning Commissioner, Blake Jenkins reported that the Commission approved the Preliminary Skeen Subdivision and recommended final approval of Phase 1 of the Robson Farms Subdivision. He commented on a discussion about Cul-De-Sac Length. He indicated that the Planning Commission would like a work meeting with the City Council to firm up a decision on the matter. He reported that an update to the General Plan was deliberated. Mayor Beesley acknowledged that a joint work meeting is tentatively scheduled for June 3<sup>rd</sup>, prior to City Council meeting.

Discussion/Motion: Zoning Amendment – Favero Property – 1295 N 4700 W – RE-30 to RE-18.5 and A-2 to RE-15

Mayor Beesley identified major trails to be developed along corridors that would otherwise be underutilized, including along canals and rivers, and in areas to connect other public spaces and parks. He noted that there's an opportunity for a linear park system which could include the right of way associated with the North Branch of Warren Canal which runs east and west in the western most corner of the community. Councilmember Sadler apologized for postponing an appointment to visit the locale with Tom Favero. He requested that the matter be tabled until he, and other councilmembers, can assess existing on-site conditions. He indicated that he'll abstain from voting if a motion is made at this point. Councilmember Beal advised that the Planning Commission's recommendation of denial of this application be followed. Councilmember Skeen voiced concurrence with the Planning Commission's recommendation. Councilmember Weston informed that he has not been able to inspect the area of the proposed rezone. He suggested that the agenda item be tabled for two weeks. **Councilmember Beal moved to deny the Zoning Amendment – Favero Property – 1295 N 4700 W – RE-30 to RE-18.5 and A-2 to RE-15.** Mayor Beesley allowed Tom Favero to address the Council. Tom Favero remarked on the postponed site visit by councilmembers, prior to the meeting. He commented on difficulties related to selling a family farm and his conflicting feelings about putting his farm up for sale. He pointed out differing land use arrangements prescribed in current and past general plans. He asserted; if zoning of his property doesn't change, the aforementioned open space and trail system that would benefit the public will not be realized. He explained how he's curtailed regular farming operations in order to be a good neighbor to new developments adjacent to his ground. He stated that he'll restore full agricultural processes regardless of the impact on nearby residential subdivisions if the zoning amendment is denied. Councilmember Beal informed that the City's plan for parks and trails requires negotiating acquisitions and other terms with multiple land owners. She proposed that parks, recreation and open space objectives be considered concurrently, in a full update of the Future Land Use Map. Mayor Beesley spoke about a recent update of the Plain City General Plan, accomplished in 2018. He voiced his support of the prescribed RE-30 zoning on the land in question. He noted that working with property owners to achieve parks, recreation and open space objectives will be necessary in the future. **Councilmember Skeen seconded Councilmember Beal's motion to deny the requested Zoning Amendment. Councilmembers Beal and Skeen voted aye. Councilmember Sadler abstained. Councilmember Weston voted nay. The motion failed.** Mayor Beesley directed that review of the application be continued and the matter be placed on the agenda for an upcoming City Council meeting.

Discussion/Motion: Approval of Tentative 2021-22 City Budget

**Councilmember Skeen moved to approve the Tentative 2021-22 City Budget.**

Councilmember Beal made mention of amendments that were discussed at a preceding work session, specifically related to a new Assistant to the Mayor position. Mayor Beesley affirmed that the Tentative 2021-22 City Budget can be adjusted before final approval is given. **Councilmember Beal seconded the motion. Councilmembers Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Final Approval of Final Subdivision – Robson Farms Phase 1, approx. 3626 W 1975 N

**Councilmember Sadler motioned to approve Final Subdivision – Robson Farms Phase 1, as presented. Councilmember Skeen seconded the motion. Councilmembers Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

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Discussion/Motion: Resolution – Interlocal Agreement – RAMP – Jogging/Walking Trail Lee Olsen Park Football Field

Mayor Beesley suggested that this proposal be tabled as particulars have not fully been sorted out. He indicated that the Recreation Department has requested a four-lane track. Councilmember Sadler expressed his opinion that a four-lane asphalt track is not ideal for the track club to run on. He recommended building a separate track with a more forgiving surface if one is needed for that purpose. He commented on the purported unwillingness of Fremont High School to let the Plain City track club use their venue. **Councilmember Sadler motioned to table the proposed Resolution – Interlocal Agreement – RAMP – Jogging/Walking Trail Lee Olsen Park Football Field. Councilmember Weston seconded the motion. Councilmembers Beal, Sadler, Weston and Skeen voted aye. The motion carried.**

Discussion/Motion: Resolution Declaring Plain City a Second Amendment Sanctuary

The Mayor asked Jim Scheer to read the proposed resolution:

**A RESOLUTION DECLARING PLAIN CITY A SECOND AMENDMENT SANCTUARY,  
AND FOR THE SUPPORT OF CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS CONTAINED IN THE BILL OF RIGHTS  
AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Plain City (herein “City”) is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Utah; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Plain City Council finds that in conformance with the provisions of UCA §10-3-717, the governing body of the city may exercise all administrative powers by resolutions; and,

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds declaring Plain City a second amendment sanctuary city of the utmost importance; and,

**WHEREAS**, acting through the United States Constitution, the people created the government to be their agent in the exercise of a few defined powers, while reserving to the citizens the right to decide matters which concern their lives, liberty, and property in the ordinary course of affairs; and

**WHEREAS**, these unalienable rights are codified in the United States Constitution and the Utah Constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution states: “A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed”; and

**WHEREAS**, the right of the people to keep and bear arms is further protected from infringement by State and Local Governments under the Ninth, Tenth, and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States of America; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 1 of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America states, “No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws”; and

**WHEREAS**, the Supreme Court of The United States in *District of Columbia v. Heller*, 554 U.S. 570, 599-603 (2008) recognized that according to the Second Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America, the individual’s right to keep and bear arms is not limited to the individual’s service in a militia; and

**WHEREAS**, the Supreme Court of The United States further recognized in *McDonald v. City of Chicago*, 561 U.S. 742, 791 (2010) that the Second Amendment to the Constitution was incorporated by the Fourteenth Amendment and thereby made applicable to the States; and

**WHEREAS**, Article 1 Section 6, of the Constitution of Utah provides, “The individual right of the people to keep and bear arms for security and defense of self, family, others, property, or the state, as well as for other lawful purposes shall not be infringed; but nothing herein shall prevent the Legislature from defining the lawful use of arms”; and

**WHEREAS**, from time to time, certain legislation might be introduced in the United States Congress or in the Utah State Legislature which could infringe upon the rights of law-abiding citizens to keep and bear arms, as guaranteed by the Constitution of Utah and by the United States Constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, Local governments have the legal authority to refuse to cooperate with state and federal firearm laws that violate those rights and to proclaim a Second Amendment Sanctuary for law-abiding citizens in their cities; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of Plain City Utah, finds that this resolution is reasonably related to the safety, health, morals, and welfare of Plain City inhabitants to protect them from any law that would unconstitutionally restrict the Second Amendment rights of the citizens of Plain City.

**NOW THEREFORE**, be it resolved by the City Council of Plain City Utah as follows: That the Plain City Council hereby declares that public funds of the City shall not be used to unlawfully restrict the individual rights of the citizens of Plain City to keep and bear arms as recognized in the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Utah; nor shall public funds of the City aid in the unlawful restriction of those same individual rights; and

That the Plain City Council hereby declares Plain City, Utah a “Second Amendment Sanctuary,” where the constitutionally protected individual rights of law abiding citizens to keep and bear arms, and of their use in the security and defense of self, family, others, and property, are supported; and That the Plain City Council hereby declares its opposition to unconstitutional restrictions on the right to bear arms, and opposes any efforts to unconstitutionally restrict all such rights secured by the Bill of Rights.

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**Effective Date**

This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon passage and adoption.
